	Today we will be looking at the picture story book <i>Big Rain Coming by Katrina Germein and Bronwyn Bancroft</i> .  About the book - In the Australian Outback, while staring at the dark clouds in the south, Old Stephen predicts there's "big rain coming". The children, panting dogs and fat green frogs do what they can to keep cool while waiting for the rain. Everybody waits. When will the rain come?  Activity: As you read the sentence below, create an image in your head (visualise) and in your workbook draw the picture to match the sentence.  'The night was so warm that Rosie's kids dragged their beds outside to maybe feel some breeze while they slept.'  Sometime when you are visualising you make connections without even knowing it.  Have you ever had a really hot night where you had to drag your bed somewhere cooler?  Go on Literacy Planet/ Reading Eggs/ EPIC books (optional)	Remember, they don't need to be spelt the same, they just need to rhyme.  Once you have your list, divide them into groups based on the way they are spelt.  How many different graphemes (letter combinations) did you find for the 'oo' phoneme (sound) in the word 'you' (sounds like y-oo)?  Can you see that words do not have to be spelt the same to rhyme? A sundial is a device for telling the time. It has a sticking up part called a gnomon which casts a shadow. The gnomon is set on a flat surface on which twelve hours of the day are marked. #### Metaphors (Metaphorical Poem and Free Verse Poem)

A metaphor (pronounced Meh-Tah-Four) makes a comparison between things, places and emotions. Metaphors help us explain a concept by relating it to something everyone knows.

Everyone knows that life can be exciting, and that life has it's up and downs. So why not use a metaphor and say..

Life is like a rollercoaster

Metaphors can be really creative, ideas don't always have to be related.

#### For Example:

I'm as happy as a frog on a log with a mouthful of flies.

The emotion of happiness and frogs aren't exactly related, but the metaphor makes sense.

Your metaphors can be as long and as creative as you would like.

Have a go at writing 4 metaphors. Challenge- Write a metaphor that is 3 sentences long.

#### **Calculating Change**

Change is the money you get back if you pay more than what is needed to buy something.

#### For Example:

If I go to the shop and it costs \$4.00 for a sandwich, and I give the shopkeeper 5 dollars. The person at the shop gives me 1 dollar back so that I am paying 4 dollars for the sandwich.
